

The Maori & Aborigine Cultures - Life at the Bottom of the World"

Join **Kate Borduas,** Florida Master Naturalist and World Traveler, at a lecture, "The Maori & Aborigine Cultures - Life at the Bottom of the World", at Bayshore Live Oak Park on November 1 at 10:00 am

. Kate will explore the differences between the historic Maori and Aborigine societies and the possible implications once the modern world descends upon them.

New Zealand was geographically isolated for 65 million years and, with no land mammals, was home to an amazing host of bird life – much of it flightless. New Zealand was the last major land mass on earth to be populated – around 1200 AD – when the Polynesian voyageurs completed their Pacific Expansion. The Maori were in many ways very western: warriors who traded, built forts, made marriage alliances, had a social hierarchy that included slaves.

The Aborigine people lived in complete isolation for 60,000 years before encountering the west – in the person of famed explorer, James Cook. Their culture, while a miracle of adaptation in harsh terrain, was as unlike western civilization as can be imagined. Stasis, rather than change, was cultivated.

Heritage Monitoring Scouts (HMS Florida) is a public engagement and citizen science program focused on tracking changes to archaeological sites at risk, particularly those impacted by climate change in the form of erosion and sea level rise. Join Florida Public Archaeology Network (FPAN) staff for this full day training session to become a heritage monitoring scout. The morning will be spent inside the facility, covering threats to archaeological sites, how to identify some common site types and artifacts, and the best way to record and monitor them. The afternoon will be spent visiting and monitoring the site!

Archbold Lodge, constructed in 2011. The Lodge provides overnight accommodations for up to 41 guests within the 14 bedrooms. Each dorm-style bedroom overlooks the native landscape of the Florida scrub to the northeast - a beautiful view. There are short <u>self-guided trails</u> accessible from the lodge.

Join the Citrus and Pinellas chapters of FNPS on a field trip to learn about the endangered scrub habitats of the Lake Wales Ridge at Archbold Biological Station in Venus, FL (about 20 miles south of Sebring) on Nov. 10-12. There is a limit of 25 people.

On Friday, Nov. 10th, we will meet for dinner at Casa Tequila Mexican restaurant in Lake Placid, then continue to Archbold.

Our trip will include a Saturday morning tour, guided by Archbold's education director. We will stop for a box lunch and then may hike another trail.

On Sunday morning, we plan to stop for breakfast on our way to visit Lake June-in-Winter Scrub State Park, an 845-acre preserve that has a half-mile nature trail and is home to some of Florida's most endangered plant and animal species. Please register and pay using the online form at the link below and sign the Release of Liability form. The cost is \$97 per person and includes 2 nights in dormitory-style rooms (double occupancy), and 3 meals on Saturday including continental breakfast, bag lunch and a hot dinner. (The form allows you to specify a roommate and to request a vegetarian meal.)

Friday dinner and Sunday breakfast are "dutch", not included in the \$97 price.

The Importance of Native Plants An evening Lecture by Craig Huegel, Ph.D.

Craig Huegel, Ph.D. is a wildlife biologist with a special interest in the interaction of wildlife and habitat, especially as it relates to developed landscapes. He is a founding member of the Pinellas Chapter of the Florida Native Plant Society, writes a popular blog about Florida native wildflowers, and operates a small native wildflower nursery from his home in Seminole.

Dr. Huegel has written five books about native plants. His sixth, a book about "How Plants Work" is die to be published spring 2018 by the University of Florida Press. Currently he serves as an adjunct professor at St. Petersburg College in the Biology Department and as a consultant on a wide variety of native plant projects.
