Natives Cultivars Nativars by Lois Cantwell

We can go back a few centuries to find men of science who began tinkering with plants from the wild to make them bigger, bolder and more desirable than their native states. By definition, these are cultivated plant varieties with one or more distinct differences from the original species, such as flower color, leaf variation or disease resistance.

In more modern times the industry has taken "cultivation" to a higher level. These days, we see the term "nativar" more and more frequently. With environmental awareness issues at the forefront, nurseries are making "the natives" more appealing to the consumer by advertising them as such (cultivars of native plants) so they can promote them as pollinator friendly, which is a popular hot button.

But, are they really? If you have a mixture of cultivars and natives in your garden, watch them to see where the bees, butterflies and hummingbirds go. The larger concern is how do the native plant societies around the country view the use of native "altered-natives"? Over the last 500 years, Florida flora has been over-run by the myriad of introduced exotic and invasive species and their cultivars. Now the industry is messing with the natives. Do we continue to emphasize the use of "true" natives and such concepts as ecotypes, native plant communities and wildlife habitats from a purist perspective?

Or, so we accept the concept of using "nativars" to attract more people to accepting native plants into their yards? Will they really serve a purpose or just add to the continued dilution of native plants in the

Florida landscape. Do the nativars come true to type from seed or revert (hopefully) back to the actual native form? Lots of questions--what do you think?

Mysteries of Migration" by Florida Master Naturalist Kate Borduas



The Charlotte Harbor Environmental Center (CHEC) is pleased to offer the program "Mysteries of Migration" by Florida Master Naturalist Kate Borduas at 10 AM on Wednesday, October 18 at Bayshore Live Oak Part in Port Charlotte.

What is Migration? Which species Migrate? Why do they migrate? And just how do they migrate? European eels, for example, travel thousands of miles arriving with pinpoint accuracy at a destination they have never been. Monarch butterflies make a multi-generational round trip each year. Birds weighing only few grams can fly thousands of miles over open ocean. Arctic Terns have an annual round trip migration of 25,000 miles.

Kate will focus on the fall and spring migration of birds that we see here in Florida and she will explain how and why birds are able to make these epic journeys.

Demonstration Garden


Hurricane Irma
